1 2 3	<i>Recognizing</i> that free and equal access to education is a fundamental human right guaranteed by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Convention on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, and reaffirmed by the Convention on the Rights of the Child,
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5	Guided by the Dakar Framework for Action and the United Nations Millennium
6	Development Goals, in which member states committed to ensure that by the year 2015,
7	children throughout the world, boys and girls alike, would be able to fully complete their
8	primary education and that they would have equal access to all levels of education,
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10	<i>Reaffirming</i> resolution 56/116,
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12	Disturbed that over the last two decades their has been an increasing trend
13	towards the charging of matriculation fees and the privatization of education as a solution
14	to providing education,
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16	Convinced that information technologies, which are a cost effective tool with the
17	potential to reach all levels of society in all geographical areas, can significantly
18	contribute to eradication of global illiteracy,
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20	Deeply concerned that the gender gap in education still persists, which is reflected
21	in the fact that over sixty-four percent of the worlds adult illiterates are women,
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23	Recognizing that future resolutions will address the issue of structure and specific
24	problems;
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26	1. Calls upon all governments to intensify their efforts to provide all of their
27	citizens at least six years of free and equal primary education by the year 2012;
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29	2. Calls upon all states to develop national educational plans in accordance with
30	the Dakar Framework for Action and to set targets and timetables that include specific
31	educational goals:

*33 3. Urges* the fuller implementation of the potential of information technologies to
advance literacy and public education, as called for in 56/158;

*4. Draws attention* to the recent steps to create the "\$100 PC", and encourages all
 computer developers, specialized agencies, organizations of the United Nations system
 and the relevant intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations to assist in this
 monumental project;

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5. *Appeals* to all governments and to economic and financial institutions, both
 national and international, to lend greater financial and material support to the efforts to
 increase literacy and to achieve the goals of education for all.
