SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Outcome document of the Special Event to follow-up efforts made towards achieving the Millennium Development Goals

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Plenary (Concurrent)

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- 1 *Recognizing* the accomplishments that have been made with the Millennium Development Goals,
2 *Acknowledging* that healthcare targets of the Millennium Development Goals are not projected to be met
3 across all countries,
4 *Commending* efforts made by United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) in its efforts to improve healthcare
5 in vulnerable regions,
6 *Understanding* the accountability framework established under the High Level Political Forum (HLPF) for
7 the purpose of tracking and monitoring progress and achievements under the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs),
8 1. *Encourages* nations to engage in public service campaigns to teach the importance of healthcare within
9 communities through any of the following but not limited to:
10 (a) flyers;
11 (b) radio;
12 (c) television advertisements;
13 (d) specialized programs;
14 2. *Supports* the development of community centers that promote holistic health:
15 (a) including physical health services;
16 (b) including mental health services such as counseling and rehabilitation services;
17 3. *Recommends* the formation of school programs that work to promote knowledge through healthcare
18 education;
19 4. *Encourages* schools to provide free meals, which would work as both incentive for students to go to school
20 and a method of combating malnutrition;
21 5. *Suggests* More Economically Developed Countries (MEDCs) consider the Debt-To-Health initiative in
22 regards to Less Economically Developed Countries (LEDCs) that owe them debt:
23 (a) To cancel the often crippling debt that serves as an obstacle to the path of sustainable develop-
24 ment;
25 (b) To ensure that investment into healthcare access and technology is occurring in the developing
26 world;
27 6. *Requests* the delivery of vaccinations against viruses particularly in areas where this practice is not already
28 routine:
29 (a) These vaccinations would be delivered by licensed medical professionals or other individuals that
30 have been trained and are under the supervision of a medical professional;
31 (b) These vaccinations would be delivered particularly in schools but also in offices and other areas
32 frequented by locals on a scheduled basis;
33 (c) The exact vaccinations to be delivered would be determined by a regional or even local basis;

34 (d) Should supplies of vaccinations be low or non-existent, MEDCs and NGOs are urged to deliver
35 supplies;

36 (e) MEDCs should also aid medical professionals in LEDCs in developing and maintaining supplies
37 of appropriate vaccines;

38 7. *Encourages* the production and deployment of Medical Mobile Clinics (MMCs) including vans, bikes and
39 helicopters in their arsenal:

40 (a) The services provided can range from first-aid to life saving treatment, this decision is up to
41 regional discretion;

42 (b) The services provided can range from first-aid to life saving treatment, this decision is up to

44 (c) These provide services at a subsidized rate to areas that are low scoring on the HDI (Human
45 Development Index);

46 8. *Suggests* the primary utilization of healthcare technology transfers from MEDCs to LEDCs to create
47 sustainable improvements in healthcare facilities and provision, this includes but is not limited to:

48 (a) hospital beds;

49 (b) surgical equipment.
