SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Rights of indigenous peoples

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Third Committee

The General Assembly Third Committee,

Recalling the affirmation of the equality of indigenous peoples with fellow citizens of Member States within the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP),

Further recalling the International Labour Organization's (ILO) Indigenous and Tribal People's Convention of 1989, which stresses that human rights be afforded to all indigenous peoples,

Desiring for United Nations Member States who signed the aforementioned agreements to further develop their understanding of the ways in which indigenous peoples can be further integrated into their societies and respected as citizens,

Recommends that the Economic and Social Council pursues the rebranding of the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (UNPFII) as the Transnational Assembly for the Protection of Indigenous Rights (TAPIR) to emphasize the significance of indigenous cultures and their connection to the natural world, as well as an enhancement of the current capabilities of UNPFII,

Lamenting the unilateral loss of indigenous cultural history and language throughout the world as a result of imperialism, colonialism and oppression,

Recognizing that indigenous communities have a long history, relationship with and responsibility for the environment,

Acknowledging the outsized effects of climate change on indigenous communities and the vital role indigenous peoples have historically played in protecting the environment and combating climate change,

Further acknowledging the significance of self-sufficiency that enables indigenous peoples to shape their cultural and social development in a manner that reflects their identity and autonomy,

Stressing the unilateral preservation of the sovereignty of all Member States,

- 1. Recommends that the Economic and Social Council pursues the rebranding of the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (UNPFII) as the Transnational Assembly for the Protection of Indigenous Rights (TAPIR) to emphasize the significance of indigenous cultures and their connection to the natural world, as well as an enhancement of the current capabilities of UNPFII:
- (a) Recommends that assemblies be held over one week, at the beginning of each annual quarter, at various countries willing to host and approved to do so by the body;
- (b) Recommends that Member States that have signed the UNDRIP to create representative subassemblies composed of appointed representatives from local indigenous communities to report on the state of developments in these communities to TAPIR;
- (c) Recommends that membership within the assembly would be increased from 16 members to 24 to increase global representation of indigenous groups, protecting their land and ways of life:
- 2. Encourages Member States to provide voluntary multilingual education and employment opportunities, emphasizing that indigenous peoples have the choice to remain, work and learn in their own indigenous community or non-indigenous communities;

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- 3. Urges Member States to promote awareness of indigenous issues and to encourage communication between indigenous and non-indigenous groups, so as to discourage prejudice towards indigenous peoples and to encourage the employment of indigenous peoples by raising exposure between employers and indigenous peoples:
- (a) Recommends that Member States offer work-readiness programs for indigenous populations, training indigenous peoples in common vocational skills and to prepare them for participation in national economies;
- (b) Member States are further encouraged to enact multilateral programs aimed at employing and empowering indigenous artistry and craftsmanship, for the purposes of including indigenous peoples within the economic life of Member States, to raise representation of indigenous artists and for the protection of indigenous forms of commerce;
- 4. Encourages Member States to provide opportunities for representation within local and national governments for indigenous voices to be represented and increase possibilities for self-determination;
- 5. *Proposes* that Member States consult indigenous peoples about their historical and environmental connections to land when considering development and expansion;
- 6. *Encourages* Member States to consider fair access by indigenous groups to resources, such as food, healthcare, energy and more, when designing their infrastructure:
- (a) Hospitals and healthcare centers located in areas that are accessible from regions inhabited by indigenous groups;
- (b) Fair access to shopping centers that offer balanced options and serve diverse nutritional needs;
- (c) Schools, libraries and public works that affirm indigenous practices and languages located in metropolitan hubs, as well as locations easily accessed from rural areas.
