SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Situation in the Congo

SUBMITTED TO: The Historical Security Council – 1961

The Historical Security Council – 1961,

Acknowledging that the Situation in the Republic of the Congo is that of dire humanitarian consequences,

Affirming the UN Charter's mission to maintain international peace and security and the importance of taking collective measures for the prevention and removal of threats to peace,

Recalling Security Council resolution 143 (1960) of 14 July 1960, 145 (1960) of 22 July 1960 and 146 (1960) of 9 August 1960 concerning the failure of the Government of Belgium to withdraw all of its of military personnel from the territory of the Republic of the Congo, as has been demanded by the Congolese government,

9 Underlining that outbreaks of violence and proliferation of arms by armed elements in the Re-10 public of the Congo continue to pose a threat to the stability in the region, humanitarian, urging an 11 immediate cessation of violence and respect for international humanitarian lawincluding any obliga-12 tions to allow full, safe and unhindered humanitarian access, ,

Noting the concerns of member-states regarding the political tensions around the world, including but not limited to the colonial influences on the African continent, as well as the broader geopolitical entanglements,

*Emphasizing* the importance of a peaceful and diplomatic solution to the situation in the Republic of the Congo,

18 *Reiterating* the importance of respecting Congolese sovereignty,

*Urging* the international community to address the underlying socioeconomic factors contributing to instability in the Congo, including poverty, inequality and unemployment, through targeted development aid and trade policies and for all external actors to refrain from actions that exacerbate regional instability or violate international law,

1. Declares the situation in the Republic of the Congo as a Humanitarian Crisis;;

2. Utilizes humanitarian organizations, including but not limited to the Red Cross and similar 25 programs, to distribute food, clean water and medical and sanitary products to those affected by the 26 conflict in the Republic of the Congo;;

27 3. Calls for the establishment of a Multilateral Oversight Committee made up of non-aligned 28 nations to oversee the delivery and use of aid by the Republic of the Congo::

(a) Emphasizes that no member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization or the Warsaw
Pact be involved in said oversight committee;;

(b) Recommends that this oversight committee should initially focus on humanitarian aid: food, water and shelter, and then on more preventative efforts to ensure a safe future in the Republic of the Congo;;

(c) Establishes that the distribution of humanitarian aid would be up to the discretion
of the Multilateral Oversight Committee;;

36 (d) Requires monthly reports by the Oversight Committee to be sent to the Security

37 Council;;

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38 4. Calls for the establishment of a monetary fund in which any nation or organization::

(a) Empowers the fund to supply aid and resources, regarding the crisis in the Congo,
to secure the necessary monies for the oversight committee to allocate resources efficiently;;

(b) Allows any excess monies to be collected from the World Bank;;

5. Recommends the coordination of aid, intended to serve all humanitarian crises in the entirety of the country, via the following pathways::

44 (a) Serves the humanitarian needs of the Congolese through the port of Boma in the 45 Republic of the Congo;;

(b) Serves the humanitarian needs of the people in the Congolese province of Katanga
through the Trusteeship territory of Tanganyika and then Bougainville, a border city located in Western
Tanganyika;;

6. Supports the deployment of a secondary peacekeeping force from member states selected by the Oversight Committee, under the supervision of the United Nations, tasked with protecting supply lines of aid::

(a) Recommends that the number of peacekeeping forces assigned to each humanitarian aid route should be determined by the Secretary-General;;

54 (b) Suggests that the total number of troops within this force not exceed 1500 personnel,;

55 7. Endorses the implementation of development initiatives led by the United Nations Opera-56 tion in the Congo aimed at rebuilding Congolese infrastructure destroyed by conflict, such as roads, 57 healthcare facilities and schools;:

58 (a) Further recommends that international organizations and non-governmental enti-59 ties assist in the rebuilding initiatives;;

60 (b) Urges that all rebuilding efforts in the Republic of the Congo be supervised and 61 funded by the United Nations Economic and Social Council, which already generally oversees all en-62 tities working with the UN..
