

SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescent's Health (2016-2030)

SUBMITTED TO: The World Health Assembly

The World Health Assembly,

Deeply disturbed by the sexual violence taking place against women, children and adolescents 1 across the globe, 2

Cognizant that cultural differences and perceptions of gender influence how sexual violence is 3 perceived and addressed by delegations' medical, legal and educational institutions, 4

Recognizing that the safety and health of women, children and adolescents carry higher prece-5 dent over cultural beliefs and societal perceptions, 6

Deeply concerned about the effects of sexual violence in other areas of physical and mental 7 health. 8

Alarmed by the fact that in 2024, UN Women reported that, on a global scale, almost one in 9 three women have been subjected to physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence, non-partner 10 sexual violence or both at least once in their lives, 11

Taking into consideration that victims are more likely to suffer from depression, anxiety dis-12 orders, unplanned pregnancies, sexually transmitted infections and Human Immunodeficiency Virus 13 (HIV),14

Recognizing the need for improved sexual education globally, especially within rural regions, 15

Desiring to alter the global perception and treatment of sexual violence against women, re-16 framing it from a social issue to a health issue, 17

1. Calls upon Member States to introduce or edit their sex education curriculum: 18

19 (a) *Recognizes* that preventative education in childcare and educational institutions plays a major role in combatting sexual violence; 20

(b) *Implements* culturally and age-appropriate sex education; 21

- (c) Discusses family planning and interpersonal relationships; 22
- (d) Considers how socioeconomic status influences access and perception of sex edu-23 cation;
- 24

(e) Shifts away from casting blame upon victims and instead focusing on holding per-25 petrators accountable for their actions; 26

2. Encourages Member States to address in their policies on sexual violence against women 27 children and adolescents critical areas such as gender-based violence, female genital mutilation, child 28 marriage, combat-related sexual violence and human trafficking; 29

3. Recommends that Member States produce educational materials to the public about sex-30 ual violence that is accessible to all individuals regardless of socioeconomic and educational back-31 grounds in both printed and auditory advertisements; 32

4. Further invites Member States to collaborate to produce campaigns: 33

(a) *Encourages* women, children and adolescent victims to report sexual violence and
seek professional help;

(b) Destigmatizes the reporting and discussion of sexual violence;

5. *Urges* Member States to adapt their legal and medical definitions related to sexual violence to reflect those provided by the United Nations;

6. *Welcomes* the creation of an annual, collaborative World Health Assembly report that pro-

vides Member States with comprehensive knowledge, practices, data and research on the negative
impacts of sexual violence.
